Meeting Space: Free to the Public

Equipped with powerful, up-to-date technology, the Dr. Jerome I. Marcus Learning and Meeting Commons at the Main Library and the SE branch can seat up to 12 people. Rooms at other branches and the RPL Foundation can hold up to 30 people.

Public Computer and Internet Access

Youths and adults can use the free public computers at all RPL locations, and WiFi is accessible 24-7 outside the building. Plus, the Main Library offers computer and internet classes including Word and Excel—all free.

Outreach Initiatives

From early literacy education to delivery services to senior residences, RPL works hard to provide all city residents access to our collections and services.

Local History & Genealogy Research

The Pennsylvania Room at the Main Library houses a special, uncirculated collection of materials covering the history of Reading and Berks County. A dedicated staff member is available to assist you with genealogy research.



Our collection comprises over 300,000 materials, including traditional books, DVDs, and periodicals. Our non-fiction titles cover a vast array of subjects, and our fiction selection is truly comprehensive. Patrons with vision limitations can borrow our large-print titles.

Spanish Language Collection

Children and Teens

Collection

The Children's Department houses the largest collection of books in the county. Both the children's and teen departments have a diverse collection of books including nonfiction, graphic novels ,and Manga. The collection features the newest fiction and easy books, and a large Spanish-language section.

Children's Programming

Our award-winning Children's Library offers everything from traditional story times to innovative programming like Food for Thought, Mindful Yoga, Anime Club, and sensory friendly nights.

Each summer brings a reading challenge with incentives and prizes along with exciting in-person performances, weekly STEM activities, crafting, cooking, movement, and more.

Teen Scene

The Teen Loft includes a lounge area to meet friends, play games, and use computers. Teen programming is designed to foster creativity, collaboration, and leadership. Founded in 1863, Reading Public Library is the sixth oldest library in America. The building that houses RPL's Main Library was completed in 1913, funded by industrialist-turned-philanthropist Andrew Carnegie. The first three branches were built between 1917 and 1927. Today's branch locations serve the same neighborhoods as the original branch libraries.
